

## **MA Orientation Program**

Most people focus on the big financial issue of raising his or her budget; however, integrity and stewardship are also critical issues. An AGWM missionary proves to be a good steward of his or her resources as he or she becomes familiar with the various forms, reports, and budget responsibilities associated with his or her mission's assignment. While the filling out and maintaining of such forms and reports may seem cumbersome or complex at times, it does not need to be so.
